#### Inspirational: Joshua and Jacob






Diagnosed as autistic, Joshua defied expectations by becoming one of the youngest people to study at Oxford University at just 6 years old! His brilliance was evident from infancy, by 10 months, he could identify letters on a keyboard, and by age 3, he was fluent in Japanese.

His passion for learning led him to study Philosophy and History at Oxford, where he earned a Certificate of Excellence with distinction in both subjects.

But Joshua's story doesn't stop at academic achievements. He is also a powerful advocate for autism acceptance and diversity, using his platform to highlight the unique challenges faced by Black individuals in accessing autism support. His efforts have earned him recognition, including being named the Positive Role Model of the Year at the UK's National Diversity Awards and being listed among the top 30 most remarkable autistic people making a global impact.

Joshua dreams of becoming one of the world's youngest neurosurgeons and is dedicated to making a difference. In a TEDx talk, he shared his vision: "I want to save the earth. I want to change the world and change people's ideas to doing the right things about earth."

Mum Kristine said, "The way that autistic people think is beautiful, and we need to stop stripping them of that and to try to stop making them the same. As Temple Grandin says, they are 'Different, Not Less." Mum Kristine continued, one must admit that people with autism may think "differently," but they sure are anything but "less."





Lucy Bronze has found that some of her differences have been her strengths. "How I process things, being super-focused. People always say, 'Oh, you're so passionate about football'," Bronze says, "I don't know if I'd say I'm passionate, I'm obsessed. That's my autism, it's my hyper-focus on football." As someone who started playing senior football at 16, it is remarkable that Bronze is still performing at the highest level at 33. She says she partly has autism to thank for her longevity. "Something that is really good for ADHD and autism is exercise. Having that focus, something to do, keeping moving," she says, "Training every day is amazing for me. Some of the other girls will be like: 'Are you sure you're 33 because you don't stop?' All the things I have because of autism have worked in my advantage."

#### James McClean: Adult Diagnosis

Autism was something that I never knew too much about, even though it had been with me forever. I was diagnosed as autistic in 2023, having had our daughter, Willow-Ivy, diagnosed previously.

When I decided to go through the diagnosis process, it was because there were so many similarities between Willow and me. I had thought about it for a long time, particularly watching Willow grow up, seeing her little ways, her little differences to her older siblings and recognising that her family was her 'safe space'.

Bella Ramsey Opens Up About Their Liberating Autism Diagnosis

"There's No Reason For People Not To Know." "I've spoken a bit about neurodivergence before, but I always for some reason didn't want to," Ramsey admitted. "I got diagnosed with autism when I was filming season one of The Last of Us." "I've always been watching and learning from people. Having to learn more manually how to socialize and interact with the people



around me has helped me with acting," they said. "I have a call time, and I'm told what to wear, how to stand, where to stand and what to eat." However, stated, "their diagnosis helped them "unmask immediately," allowing them to be their authentic self after, without feeling the need to hide."
